

## **VICE PRESIDENT'S UPDATE**

This update comes from your Vice President. President Bernard Hickey has had a compromised year in terms of health, with two stints in hospital and various complications. Not to mention dealing with the aftermath of the Hawkes Bay weather events alongside his work with the NZ Army. I'm pleased to report he is well on the mend now but is mindful of taking things a bit easy.

The Executive held a Workshop at Ellerslie Racecourse on Sunday 18 June, with Delegates from all regions attending. Our last in-person workshop was in March 2021, and we appreciated the chance to be together again to get an update on the industry and do some brainstorming. While we met in the warmth of an Ellerslie meeting room, track managers from around the country were on site in the pouring rain to inspect the developments at Ellerslie.

NZTR CEO Bruce Sharrock attended the first part of our Workshop and gave an informative presentation regarding stakes increases, new initiatives and opportunities, welfare matters and also a comprehensive update on the ENTAIN Agreement. This included information about the TAB, geoblocking, and proposed broadcasting improvements. In addition to answering our questions, he took away some points to ponder - and hopefully action - that we had raised. This included a question about how many owners are present on race day when their horse is running. No statistics are currently held but we believe it is important information to gather and analyse and this will be investigated further by NZTR through the Racing Clubs.

One thing worth mentioning is that, to date, Racing Clubs are the only members of NZTR. However, with the passing of the Racing Industry Act 2020, Bernard has been advocating strongly that the organisations representing Owners, Trainers, Breeders and Jockeys should also be members, representing their interest as participants in the industry. Progress has been made on this, with these organisations now submitting a report to the monthly Stakeholder Meetings which enables wider contribution and therefore improves communication and understanding across the industry. The NZTR Constitution will require a rewrite around governance matters to align with the intent of the Act and also with the new Incorporated Societies Act which will come into force in October 2023.

At the Workshop, the Executive discussed NZTROF's purpose and future direction, with acknowledgement that NZTROF becoming an advocate for all registered owners is the way of the future. A full proposal document on this concept is being prepared for consideration and we'll keep you informed. This won't impact our current Associations who all do a great job on behalf of our members. I'd like to thank the officers, delegates and committee members of all our Regional Associations for their efforts.

Whilst racing has had a myriad of challenges recently, there is plenty of raceday action to keep us enthused and amused. Racing over the New Zealand winter can be a bit hit and miss, given the heavy tracks, smallish fields, ongoing inclement weather and switching of race venues for one reason or another, but the jumpers have been putting on splendid displays. It's a hard slog for horses and jockeys in such conditions and the effort put in by everyone involved in getting our horses to the races, and past the finish post, is to be applauded.

The NZTROF website Winners Gallery and Racing Tales pages have recently been updated. I randomly select winning horses owned by members, choose images (with appreciation to Race Images and Monica Torreto), research past form and analyse the recent win to provide a snapshot in time. It takes time to do all this, but it is always enjoyable to capture a thrilling racing moment and share it online.

## AUCKLAND & NORTHLAND

### Members of our Auckland Association Committee have had some winners over the last quarter.

Virginia Healey and her family (the Webbs) had a wonderful debut win at Avondale on 3rd June with their 2YO US Navy Flag gelding named Geldof. Trial form was superb with a second placing and a win, so expectations were high. He'd gone out favourite and he delivered on a Heavy10 track with a strong and convincing win. He had to fight for it, but jockey Warren Kennedy made sure he never gave up. A great training performance by Peter and Dawn Williams who had Geldof primed and good to go. The family were there on course cheering him on.

Neil & Jeanette Miller have had four wins with their Belardo – Boundless gelding Double O' Seven. He got his maiden win in April, 2022 at Counties. After his third win in February 2023 on the Cambridge Synthetic he went off the boil a little and was sent south to Terri Rae in Riccarton looking for dry tracks. Then with Terri Raes magic he lined up at Oamaru and promptly had a smart win.

Craig Leishman had two recent winners – In Her Presence (a 3YO filly by Churchill) and Zoulander (a 5YO gelding by Zoustar).

In Her Presence had two wins on the trot in March and April 2023, paying a whopping \$56 for her maiden win! This filly is also part-owned by Toni Croon who runs Hotel Chatham. Toni hosted those of us on the "Racing in the Chatham's" trip in January this year.



Zoulander had her maiden win at Tauranga in April 2021, but another win was elusive. He went south to the Pitman's towards the end of 2022 and has since clocked up three more wins, including his latest on 10th April 2023 at Riverton with Kavish Chowdhoory on board. A move south can be a good one, but it's not so easy for the owners living at the other end of the country, as Neil will attest to.

Craig also has an interest in the New Zealand Derby winner, Redwood 3YO Gelding Sharp 'N' Smart. With six wins from 12 starts, including two in Australia, he's a horse to watch for the future.

Congratulations to our winning Committee members – and to all Auckland members who have experienced the thrill of the win over this April to June period. Sally The Auckland Owners AGM is to be held on Sunday 15th October 2023 in the Lady Fisher Room Ascot Stand Ellerslie at 2.30pm. Paul Wilcox, CEO of Auckland Racing, has kindly agreed to speak with us again and give us an update on the new StrathAyr track. Agenda and annual report will be available in September.

An Owner's social is planned for Saturday 28th October 2023 at Pukekohe. More information will be distributed closer to the time. The event we held in February was enjoyed by 75 members and friends so hopefully we can repeat.

I attended the NZTR Welfare Forum recently on behalf of NZTROF. The big message is that we owners along with all the other participants in the racing industry are all responsible for ensuring we maintain the necessary "Social Licence" to continue racing horses. It can never be taken for granted.

### WAIKATO/BAY OF PLENTY Jill Lunn

It was a brisk sunny day on Wednesday 26 July for the final race meeting of the Cambridge Jockey Club. From the start of the new season the clubs of Te Rapa, Cambridge and Te Awamutu racetracks will combine under the banner of Waikato Thoroughbred Racing.

It was also the final of the Martin Collins sponsored races for Maiden horses as at the 16 May 2023. Horses are eligible to race in these races as they gain points for racing on the synthetic throughout the season. Martin Collins New Zealand are the world leaders in synthetic surfaces for horses. They put in this synthetic track, and they have a 10year maintenance contract to keep it in top condition. Martin Collins have sponsored these races of \$40,000 for three years since 2021, with NZTR and the Cambridge Jockey Club. The thinking behind this was to encourage owners and trainers to race on the synthetic. The owners of the winning horse receive \$23,000.

With the new merger for the next season Waikato Thoroughbred Racing will again be seeking sponsorship for this event.

There are four races each year: 970 metres, 1300 metres and 1550 metres, and over 2000 metres. There were a number of horses in each race who had won their maiden race on this course since 16 May, which made for interesting racing.

In the end Team Rogerson's Just As Sharp won his first start in the 970 metre race, Ben Foote's Kakadu won the 1300 metre race, Andrew Forsman's Medina won the 1550 metre race and Martin Da Cruz's Elusive Capital won the 2000 metre race. While Medina and Kakadu had won on the track, Just As Sharp and Elusive Capital had not won on the synthetic before. It was a good payday for all. The owners of all these horses were thrilled with their horse's performance and the team behind Elusive Capital were particularly excited. Elusive Capital is a 6yo who has had 10 starts on the synthetic and was up against the favourites of Hammer Time and So The Fox, so they thought it might have a chance of a place.

The final race of the day was a race celebrating the Waikato Thoroughbred Racing Merger 1 August. This race was over 2000 metres and carried a purse of \$35,000. The hot favourite "Jimmy Dean" trained by Ben Foote prevailed.

Over the day Michael McNab rode 4 winners and Elen Nicholas rode 2 winners, and Martin Da Cruz and Ben Foote trained two winners each. Congratulations to all!

There was a great vibe at the Cambridge track among the owners, trainers, jockeys, officials and other racegoers and the positioning of the facilities allows for much mingling and interaction. It is a great social day at the Cambridge track.

### **HAWKES BAY**

### Tony Lyndon

The leading jumps trainers Paul Nelson and Corrina McDougal continued their successful winter winning two races at Trentham at the end of May. The first win was in the \$70,000 Awapuni Hurdles with Suliman then the \$35,000 Open Handicap with Nedwin.

Nelson and McDougal finished the season with a flourish when they picked up two wins at the Taumarunui meeting at Te Rapa at the end of July. Their rider Jack Power saluted the judge on Taiko in the Stewart Browne Memorial Hurdle and again with Raucous in the Woods Contracting Steeplechase for them.

Local lad Shaun Fannin the leading jumps jockey for 2022/23 season was at his best when winning the Hawkes Bay Hurdles on Happy Star and later in the day the Hawkes Bay Steeples on West Coast. This brought his tally to 146 wins.

Former Hastings jumps jockey Aaron Kuru proved he is one of the best jumps jockeys in Australasia when winning all 4 jumps races at Te Rapa in June. Included in his 4 wins were the Waikato Hurdles and Waikato Steeples. It was his 4th Waikato Hurdles following wins in 2015, 2018, and 2022. Kuru is now domiciled in Australia but makes himself available for our big jumping carnivals.

Hasting's trainer Guy Lowry had success on both sides of the Tasman when Penny Royal won at Awapuni and later in the day Wewillrock won a \$163,000 race at Sydney.

Waipukurau Owner Trainer Lucy de Lautour had her most successful day at the races when winning with Metallo and Ian's Legacy at Trentham in July. Her biggest success has been the Hawkes Bay Hurdles with Kip Keino who won 10 races and \$227,000 dollars in stakes.

Hawkes Bay jockey Katie Hercock has had her best season ever with 52 wins, which has brought her NZ tally to 327 wins. Hercock not only rides but trains a small team of horses in partnership with her mother Jeanann at Otane.

The Hawkes Bay Owners' Association had a successful Members Day at the Hastings Races in April. There was a \$10 surcharge for the members and their partners and a payment of \$43 a head for additional guests to pay for the two course meal.

### WANGANUI & TARANAKI Brian O'Dea

The Hill family who has had numerous winners out of the Anna Clement stable had another recently with Wheelitin, bred by John Wheeler, making her 3rd salute to the Judge.

Carey Hobbs, soon to retire from managing Taranaki Racing, continues to have success with his five-win Oso Savvy.

Dawn Symes one of the original owners-with late husband Eddie of get up and go again gelding Des De Jeu was hoping it would compete in the Grand National Steeple. He was a recent winner and probably is one of the few horses to change the rules of racing.

Puntura, winner of his eighth race at Waikato for Carole and John Lynskey, has been transferred to Australia for future racing.

PJ and Mrs SJ Cowley, part owners of Christchurch trained Night Raider, were able to celebrate his 3rd win.

Wayne Darling, one of a syndicate of twelve involved with Winkle Bay were able to see him salute the judge for the second time recently.

Nigel and Adare Auret with a win for Something Unusual continue to promote their stallion with the "Unusual" name.

Tony Dravitzki with the big smile – why does he only tell me about his winners after the race – had a good win with Tobias at Hawera.

Dave Macnab, one of the stalwarts of racing in the Wanganui region over many decades passed away in early July aged 97.

He farmed at Upokongaro at the start of the Paraparas and was active until recent months.

Dave was involved in many aspects of the thoroughbred industry. As an owner he won the prestigious Duke of Gloucester Cup three times including one success as the rider of his own horse Red Lancer.

Dave's roles with the Wanganui Jockey Club included many years on the committee, President in 1984-85 and as Patron from 2001 to 2010.

Outstanding horses he was involved with included Young Pirate, sharing ownership with George Bristol and Ian Boyland. The horse won six races, one of them over two miles at Flemington and was in the field for the Melbourne Cup, to run midfield.

Another was the magnificent jumper Tallyho Twinkletoes who won the Grand National Hurdles and Steeplechase at Riccarton then crossed to Australia to win their National Hurdles and Steeples as well. More Twinkletoes have followed but the bar was set too high.

In the mid 1960's a new rugby club was established in Dave's home area at Kaiwhaiki called Counties Rugby Club. Club rooms were established and were called the D.H. Macnab Pavilion and the grounds the Macnab Domain.

It was appropriate that Dave's Memorial Service was held at Macnab Domain.

The Macnab name in the racing industry is being carried on by descendants, his son Scotty, daughter-in -law Kayla Macnab and grand – daughter Sarah.

Dave was one of those that didn't like the limelight. One of his early trainers was the late Rita Jackson and he regularly visited her stables as part of his involvement with his thoroughbreds.

### MANAWATU/WELLINGTON Allan Fenwick

### **Rangitikei owner John Roach and his** nominated runner Bradman was the big winner in the 2022/2023 Majestic Horse **Floats Points Competition. In a close** finish Bradman just headed the very consistent Deerfield.

John Roache has been a long-time owner and has enjoyed plenty of success over the years especially from the Noel & Matthew Eales and Roydon Bergerson stables.

Bradman finished the season with 4 wins, including a hat trick and 7 minor placings from 15 starts. Other Association members Fay & Mark Fearon, Bob Wiltshire and the late Keith Towers, who passed away recently, are in the ownership group of the Roydon Bergerson trained Bradman.

Charlotte's Way, along with her trainer Roydon Bergerson and jockey Wiremu Pinn will go down in history as she was the winner of the very first race to be held on the new synthetic track at Awapuni, when it opened in May. The Pentire mare, raced by Tineke Balcombe's "In To Win" Syndicate backed up with another victory on the synthetic track at her next start.

Owner/Trainer Roger Allen has had a great run with Kahu Rock over the last 3 months of the season with 2 wins, 2 seconds and 2 fifths in her last 6 starts. The Alamosa mare has now won 8 races and close to \$150k in stakes.

The Tony, Judith & Chrissy Bambry owned filly Chantilly Lace was a runaway winner of the John Turkington Forestry Ltd Castletown Stakes (Listed) at Wanganui, scoring by a massive 10 lengths, in the hands of Lily Sutherland. Chantilly Lace became the first southern hemisphere stakes winner for her sire U S Navy Flag. Standing now at The Oaks Stud, U S Navy Flag was the champion New Zealand first-season sire for 2022-23.

The evergreen Deerfield had a busy season with 24 starts for 2 wins and 12 minor placings and over \$130k in stakes for the Bambry family. The Falkirk gelding from The Dazzler and bred by the Dennis Bros has been another flagbearer for trainer Chrissy Bambry.

Neil and Erin Connors who generally have a useful horse or two around them have had Script, a winner at Woodville and Amend representing them in the latter part of the season. Amend was a dual winner on the Awapuni synthetic track but also had 3 other minor placings. Ilone Kelly trains Amend who like Script is by the Highview Stud based stallion. Wrote.

Interllectus was a winner over hurdles at Wanganui for Douglas Duncan and Des De Jeu won the LI Hooker Manawatu Steeplechase. run at Trentham for Len Haydock.

Association Committee Members Kevin Tod and Mark Fearon share in the ownership of Get Funky, a winner at Woodville, Elaine Vine has a share in Bee Enchanted a winner in July and Cam Arnott has a share in the Hawkes Bay winner, Benefactor. Lisa Latta trains all three horses. Other Association Members Kevin and

Kristina O'Donnell bred Bee Enchanted and share in the racing partnership for him, along with Debra Masters

The Sue Walsh trained Jus Wing It was a winner at Otaki in May. David and Caroline Marner and Mark Fearon are part of the racing syndicate for this mare, who is by the Australian based sire, Hellbent.

Sister Jane bred by John & Liz Hancock and raced by them in a partnership from the Niall Quinn stable was a winner at good odds at Rotorua at the end of April and the Neil Managh bred and raced Gohugo was a winner at Hastings. Guy Lowry trains the latter.

Successful horsewoman Sylvia Kay bred and races Enrico who won at Awapuni in June at just his 3rd start. He is by El Roca and is in the stable of llone Kelly.

Hamish & Shannon MacDonald share in the ownership of Canbiteabit a winner at Awapuni in June. He is trained by Shaun Fannin and is likely to be seen out as a jumper in the near future. Now combining riding and training Shaun had a memorable 2022/2023 season, claiming the Leading Jumps Jockey title with 17 wins to go with another 8 flat wins. As a trainer he had 10 wins. Shaun has now established his training base in a barn on the Awapuni Racecourse

### CENTRAL SOUTH ISLAND

Hi and welcome from the mainland, we are well into winter now and that means National week at Riccarton is just round the corner. Some great flat racing and hopefully some better field's numbers wise for the Jumper's, Also, I'm sure the increased stakes will be well received by all for the upcoming season.

One horse that is really flying heading to National week is Third Decree, a 3yo filly by War Decree, raced in partnership by Lyall Green of Waimate. This progressive youngster has saluted in back to back races in the last month, bringing her tally to 4 wins from only 6 starts for trainer's Michael and Matthew Pitman of Riccarton. She won on the synthetic on the 29th of June in a R75 1200. She had earlier run a very fast trial over 800m so the track was going to be no problem.

Settling 5th on the outer for Kavish Chowdhoory, they popped out on the corner and set out after the leader who had kicked in the straight.

She wore Over to You down and was strong in the finish to score by a length.

A month later it was Oamaru in a 2&3yo race and showing her versatility on a heavy 10 track. Again Kavish was aboard, and settled in the trail from a handy barrier, waiting till the straight in the testing conditions. They came off the leaders back and headed down centre track where she hit the lead with 200m to go. Not completely loving the wet nature according to Lyall, she still ploughed through it to hold on by a head from the other Pitman runner Express Coup.

Lyall Green came from the Waikato and was in horses there since the 80's. He ventured south in 2000, had a win with Captain Corelli in 2004, before hooking up with Jim Bruford who syndicates horses with the Pitman's, about eight years ago.

One of the first syndicate horses was the very speedy First Serve, which won 7 of her first 9 starts before faltering tragically in the Telegraph at Trentham.

Another was Miss Tycoon Rose who won 4 from 13 and was a close second in the 1000 Guineas. Then there was Sensei who won 6 including a Hazlett Stakes and Pegasus Stakes. Two seconds in the Steward's Handicap and a third in the Telegraph were also highlights.

So far 9 horse's with Jim and the Pitman's, all winner's and north of 25 wins between them including 4 Pearl Series wins. A lot of good memories and I'm sure Third Decree will bring more of both.

Third Decree came about for them because they didn't have any racing at the time as a couple had gone to Australia. Lyall asked Jim if he had anything to syndicate, he didn't but had a young one he had bred himself, Lyall asked Jim if he liked it, he said yes and Lyall said can we get in, the rest is history, four

wins and counting, a good decision I would say.

Kerri and Lance Spence had a winner on the Riccarton synthetic in May. There 3yo filly by Per Incanto called Forever Babe broke maidens at start three in a fillies & mares maiden 1200. She was labelled urgent by jockey Krishna Mudhoo from the outside gate. They did a fair amount of work to find the lead, rounding the bend into the straight, the expected challenges came but she was very brave and was strong right to the line to prevail by half a neck. Trained and also owned by Lance and Christine Robinson of Riccarton, I'm sure there will be more success in store.

Another horse to score a double recently was Powerful Moss. The 5yo gelding by Power owned by DJ Brook, and trained by Russell McKay and daughter Ashley Harrington of Riccarton, became a 5-win horse from 28 starts. After scoring 3 on heavy tracks, the good 4 surface at Timaru over a mile in June might have looked beyond him. After an awkward beginning, from near the outside barrier, jockey Diego Montes de Oca got him to sit outside the



leader till the turn, they just kept giving and denied everyone, to win by three quarters of a length. Next it was back to a heavy 10 at Riccarton over the shorter 1400m. Again Diego was the pilot and from a much better draw was able to lead. When tackled on the corner, he found a kick which ultimately was too much for the opposition to win by 1 and a quarter lengths. Powerful Moss holds a nomination for the upcoming Winter Cup at Riccarton, all the best to connections to get into the field and I'm sure track conditions will suit him.

Good luck to everyone heading to the 3 day carnival, it should be a good one.

### **NZTR PROMOTES RACEHORSE OWNERSHIP & REHOMING RESPONSIBLY**

To obtain a 'Social Licence' and operate successfully, Thoroughbred racing needs approval and acceptance from society, with horse welfare often coming under scrutiny.

This spotlight on welfare is motivation to assess and improve systems and practices, not only to keep the abolishers at bay but also so those who love the sport can be confident that the horses are getting the best care possible.

Rehoming is important to racehorse ownership. Given that Thoroughbreds can live to well in their twenties, of which many spend around five years in the racing system, a horse has around 15 years that should be lived with purpose, quality and dignity.

Current rehoming options include private transactions or going via one of NZTR's 13 Acknowledged Retrainers who are located throughout the country. The network has rehomed 383 thoroughbreds in the 2022/23 season a significant increase from the 286 in 2021/23.

"Rehoming is an area NZTR has identified as a risk to our social licence and somewhere we can improve our practices," NZTR's Alice Riggins said.

"The majority of horses finish racing sound and have the temperaments to go on to successful careers in a wide variety of disciplines.

"We currently have a strong network of Acknowledged Retrainers throughout the country who have the skills and facilities to ensure our thoroughbreds are given the best chance to be rehomed responsibly and thrive in their lives after racing," she said.

Though the NZTR approved Acknowledged Retrainers, receive some financial assistance from the 1% Welfare Levy on prizemoney, the network only succeeds with industry wide support. NZTR encourages owners to take responsibility for the duty of care of their horses not only while racing, but during the rehoming process.

The list of requirements is small but the impact it has on successful rehoming is huge. If a horse has come to the end of its racing career and an owner or accountable person has contacted an NZTR Acknowledged Retrainer it is expected that the following conditions are met:

- Transport to the NZTR Acknowledged Retrainers property is paid by the owner or accountable person
- The horse should arrive in good body condition and be recently shod
- There should be full disclosure of medical and behavioural history. This will not negate the horse being taken but it will help place it in an appropriate career later and ensure safety of riders

 An SR24 Death or Retirement of a Thoroughbred Form is filled out by the owner or accountable person and lodged with NZTR

Acknowledged Retrainers work with tight profit margins so if the above conditions are met then it is more likely they will be able to remain financially viable and continue to provide a valuable service to the industry.

NZTR acknowledges that there are currently pressures on rehoming Thoroughbreds both domestically and internationally, some of this can be attributed to the cost-of-living crisis, extreme weather events and so on.

In the 2022-23 season NZTR spent over \$55,000 of the 1% prizemoney levy supporting acknowledged retrainers with transport, farrier work or initial health concerns.

If these costs were covered by owners this significant sum could be redirected to provide further support to the retrainers network and in other areas such as supporting the Thoroughbreds in Equestrian Sports (TiES) Series and dedicated Thoroughbred sport horse events, training clinics, Thoroughbreds in polo prizes and research.

**Per Incanto** has just missed out on his third consecutive Hong Kong winner's premiership. He's run a close 2<sup>nd</sup> to Deep Field who has had the benefit of greater numbers. **Per Incanto** currently shares top billing with I Am Invincible on the Singaporean premiership for winners.

**Little Brose**, last season's **Group 1** Blue Diamond Stakes winner, jumped out at

Flemington last week with the Hayes boys saying in the media that the **Per Incanto** colt will initially target the **Group 1** Caulfield Guineas. While he doesn't have much male representation domestically these days, Allan Sharrock's progressive gelding **Fleming** and Lisa Latta's **Bee Enchanted**, bred by Kevin and Kristina O'Donnell, have both been patiently handled and they should run well across the Hawke's Bay Spring Carnival.

It's been exciting to see the number of breeders who have transferred bookings from **Per Incanto** to **Time Test**. No need for much salesmanship from myself, his results over the last couple months speak for themselves.

As a studmaster you always want to see your new stallion's progeny hit their straps as Autumn 3YO's and that's exactly what **Time Test** has achieved, with 3 NEW Australasian black type performers in April and finishing 2nd on the NZ 3YO Winners Premiership with 16 winners just behind Savabeel on 18. For those breeders looking for value with the opportunity to gain a large win either in the sales ring or on the track, at \$10,000 + gst LFG he has got to be on your hit list.

The list of progressive **Time Test** progeny is a bit like a shopping list for the Brady Bunch, there are so many it's difficult to single any particular horse out. A number of his horses have been running extremely well on debut, and importantly, going on with it. He had three starters in the ITM/GIB Winter Final

at Ruakaka with the LA bred and sold, Kylie Fawcett trained **Delorean** clearly relishing the step to 1600m to win for an excited group of owners comprising J and O Henderson, R Joyce, N Otto and J Vaughan. The Simon Niblett bred favourite **Tough Test Harry**, who ran a meritorious fourth with top weight, is also a horse to follow.

I wasn't surprised to see the **Time Test** filly **Elsie May** win in Melbourne for Maher/ Eustace. Part owned by the Stewart family from White Robe Lodge, I thought she had little luck in the South Island Guineas races. In fact, the Maher/Eustace stable has two promising **Time Test** progeny because they also train the stakes placed filly **Running On Time**.

And what about leading Hong Kong trainer Douglas White talking about the **Time Test** 3YO **Flaming Rabbit** after he won recently and declaring him a stakes winner in waiting. **Flaming Rabbit** was previously raced as **Rocchigiani**, winner of **Group 3** Bonhams Stakes. It's important for a stallion to have runners performing in Hong Kong as it really helps the market for horses off the trial track.

Stay dry and best wishes to everyone for a safe and productive breeding season. Not sure whether duties on the farm will allow me to get up to the Hawke's Bay for the Spring Carnival but if some of these promising **Time Test**'s get to a race like the Hawke's Bay Guineas then try and keep me away.

## **GARNET HAS A FUTURE LIFE**

When Garnet finished racing last year Moira and Keiran Murdoch facilitated her going to Tracey Stobie to be retrained as a pleasure horse. This was a new aspect to owning a racehorse and we wanted to find out more. Tracey was most welcoming when we asked if we could visit, see Garnet and find out what is involved in giving a TB a useful and happy life after racing.

We headed down to Taupo thinking that we were going to write a simple article about retraining an "off the track TB." How wrong we were!

The retraining part is straightforward but the whole welfare situation anything but.

Tracey is an experienced horsewoman who loves horses and says that getting a new OTT (Off the Track) retrainer is" like opening a Xmas present – you never know what you are going to get." Her facilities are wonderful: paddocks plus open space for hacking and a dressage and jumping arena. The land is well drained – not a gumboot to be seen.

"Garnet" is an attractive, sound, athletic mare with a sensible sweet nature who had been professionally handled and trained since birth and had no bad experiences to unlearn. Garnet's trainers Moira and Keiran Murdoch have a reputation for producing and knowing horses suitable to retrain Even so, Tracey took Garnet along slowly and carefully so that when she was eventually re-homed, she would be safe and pleasurable to handle and ride.

So, she was worked in the arena, hacked over hills, learned to jump and even had a couple of days out hunting. Garnet made Tracy smile and she was looking for a home where Garnet would make someone else smile too. After 6 weeks retraining Garnet was ready to rehome and people were looking but they weren't the right homes.

Placing a horse in the right home with the right rider is so very important. Say a really keen but inexperienced sixteen-year-old girl who had had two years riding at a riding school but who had never owned a horse [neither had her parents] was not a sensible option. A girl with such limited experience could have an accident, then retraining, and thoroughbreds generally, would perhaps have been blamed.

However, the right person was out there, and Garnet is now enjoying life in Canterbury, being fussed over, hacking in the high country, doing dressage and a little jumping.

Retraining Garnet had been a pleasurable experience for all those involved. Tracey kept in touch with videos and photos, and we were able to see her progress and we are all on the new owner's contact list for Canterbury updates.

There are currently twelve Accredited Retrainers on the NZTR website all of whom

have significant equestrian expertise. Tracey first became involved with retraining through family connections and Hong Kong contacts and four years ago started taking retired racehorses from Hong Kong for International Thoroughbred Retirement (ITR). She takes two horses at a time and usually completes the retraining in 6-8 weeks. The horses are free to their new owners but a legal contract between them and ITR outlines care, management and ongoing requirements and proof of such. Tracey says these horses always come with good temperament and having lived in a big city are pretty bombproof to loud noises, people, machinery and confined spaces. and are more used to boxes than open paddocks!

An NZTR advertisement prompted Tracey to become involved with Accredited Retrainers with some of her retrainer horses now coming from NZ trainers. Tracey is aware that NZ trainers have to be those she trusts, because unlike in Hong Kong where absolutely everything that happens to the horses, from track work to veterinary treatment, is published daily on a public forum, information about the NZ OTT horse here can be woefully lacking, or at worst misleading.

At the conclusion of retraining Tracey provides a report to NZTR Welfare outlining date of arrival, date of departure and to whom the horse is going. She receives \$100 from NZTR plus she gets reimbursed for any extraordinary costs like dental work or veterinary fees.

Tracey and her partner Steve are both involved with care of the horses, but Tracey does all the riding so a maximum of two retrainer horses at a time is the norm. It is a boutique operation as she does have her own horses to ride and school [dressage with one – and hunting with the Taupo Hunt with Lenny]. Her contacts throughout the equestrian world help to rehome her horses – be they for hacking, hunting, dressage, pony club, showing, endurance eventing or polo. In fact, one of her HK rehomes is currently a very successful endurance horse.

Unfortunately, not all horses are suitable for rehoming and sadly for those who don't there are not many options.

#### Your options are: -

- Talk to your trainer about your horse's potential to be retrained
- If your trainer feels that your horse has a future off the track find a retrainer
- Breeding is a possible option for those winning mares bred in the purple.
- Some horses can have a retired life in a paddock – perhaps being a companion for another horse or 'nanny' for weanlings or a buddy to talk to. But they must be cared for.

If your horse is not sound enough or has a temperament that makes life off the track

not possible there are not many options, but it is still your responsibility. Most good horse people would say that it would be better for a racehorse to be humanely euthanised than to spend a life of neglect in a paddock, in discomfort and possible pain because its feet and teeth need attention and the feed and shelter

aren't suitable for a Thoroughbred.

If you are the sole owner, the buck stops with you. If you have even just a small share you are still technically the owner. Be the good guy that talks to the rest of the syndicate to find the right solution for life after racing for the horse that has entertained you.

#### In a perfect world retraining is an option

**Breeding** – in a perfect world speed would not be the main criteria for choosing breeding animals – but we are trying to breed a horse that is faster than all the others and to achieve that compromises of soundness and temperament will be made.

Education – in all animals [horses and humans included] education starts as babies and because what happens in the developmental stage has a huge influence on the future, education should be firm, fair and expert. This starts with the first person who puts a hand on a foal, through to the person who teaches it to pick up its feet and lead out nicely, to the calm person who is first to sit on its back and teach it manners under saddle. Your trainer is at the end of the chain here and also very important.

### Summary of the most pertinent points -

- Owners have a responsibility to ensure when the racing career is finished a practical solution is found for their horse's future.
- It is pointless investing money retraining a horse that is mentally or physically unsuited to being a hack, pony club/show horse or eventer/ hunter. Trainers know which horses do not have the necessary temperament – if not able to be retired and well cared for in a paddock they sadly should be euthanised.
- Placing an off the track horse in an appropriate home is essential for the long-term future of that animal.
- The reality is that there are not enough homes for retired racehorses.

## MANOLO (MAGOO) **A VERSATILE, SUCCESSFUL AND MUCH-LOVED RACEHORSE**

After developing a bit of an interest in racing later in life, Shane and Raye McDonnell thought they'd quite like to own a racehorse. Horseracing wasn't in the family history or DNA, although Shane's father used to break in working farm horses as a young boy. But living on a 5-acre block in Whanganui, they decided "Let's do this" and, in 2017 the y headed to Karaka to take a look, where Shane caught up with a friend – Singapore-based racing trainer Stephen Crutchley who was also at the sales and whom they trusted to give them guidance. Shane liked a horse by Jimmy Choux out of Jungle Queen and Stephen gave them the nod. Next thing they know, the **McDonnell's own a racehorse!** 

Hence, the McDonnell's had got themselves involved in the highly complex horseracing game as self-confessed greenhorns, albeit they now had great support from other race people they had met.

The ownership journey has had its ups and downs for Shane and Raye, along with plenty of learning curves. Their new acquisition proved immature and, although he won his first trial as a 2YO, it became evident he needed time to strengthen and develop so it was a case of taking things slowly to allow him to mature.

Raye had already settled on the name Manolo, even before purchase stemming from his sire's name and referencing the Spanish shoe designer Manolo Blahnik. Stable name Magoo.

Shane tells the story of when the couple were in New York in May this year and visited the Manolo Blahnik store on Fifth Avenue. The shop assistant happened to be a racing person, they told her about their beloved Manolo, showed her a photo and the woman asked them to send it to her so she could forward it to Manolo Blahnik himself in the Canary Islands! Racing connections are most definitely far and wide and random.

They decided early on to get their own silks and were keen on a black and white combo (Shane's old rugby playing colours). Once they established availability of their design and had approval, they registered the colours and engaged Donna Beck, the local agent, to get them made up through Hyland Race Colours. The black and white is certainly distinctive as it flies past the winning post in front of a field of mostly colour.

Manolo is trained by Stephen Nickalls at Rangiotu. The horse took to him like a duck to water and the McDonnell's enjoy Stephen's training style and whole approach. An honest and open relationship has unfolded and the days of "greenness" for Shane and Raye and their horse are behind them. They recognised early on that patience is indeed a virtue in this game and kept the focus on Manolo's future. After waiting things out, they are now reaping the results of their perseverance and optimism. Shane also loves the fact that Manolo spends time out on Stephen's farm mustering cattle, among other styles of training good for the mind and the muscles, and the horse loves it.

Now an 8YO (as of the new 2023-24 season), Manolo's maiden win came at Awapuni on a Heavy10 track in May 2019. Unfortunately, neither Raye nor Shane could be on course that day. Shane was in Tauranga for work, resigned to watching the race at the local sports bar. The locals were interested to know he had a horse running and he was the toast of the pub when Manolo got up for the win. Beers, buzz and beaming smiles all round!

The good news is that Shane and Raye were able to be on course for his next three wins. They love going to the races, following other horses trained by Stephen Nickalls and, naturally, they love celebrating racing success. They have also forged a lovely connection with regular rider Temyia Taiaroa

Meanwhile, the McDonnell's also have a share in the ownership of an 8YO gelding called Fame Star (by Twirling Candy) who has been racing successfully in Singapore. Trained by their friend Stephen Crutchley, he has ten wins under his belt.

As Shane's love of racing unfolded (there's no going back!) he became a member of Whanganui Jockey Club. He also googled to find out more about owning racehorses in New Zealand. He found the Owners Federation and they joined the local Whanganui Owners Association.



The McDonnell's have an old broodmare and a rescue gelding/hack from Ruatoria on their property, acquired after they had purchased Magoo, although not for breeding purposes. Having the resident mare and gelding on the farm as a mate for Magoo has been a bonus as it has given Shane and Raye the opportunity to handle a horse themselves. Shane says the mare has a bit of attitude, which keeps him on his toes, although it must be said, given Shane's professional work, he is no stranger to risk and challenge.

Shane is a self-employed construction diving company owner, working out of Whanganui and around the country. He has a team of divers who undertake complex underwater construction projects including welding, bridge infrastructure, salvage work etc. Whilst Shane has been diving for 33 years himself, he now leaves most of the active diving work to his long-term staff and focuses more on the management side of things, although occasionally does the QA dives himself for standards and compliance. It's highly specialised work and vital for infrastructure, even though hidden beneath the depths

Shane is thrilled to be in the racing game and appreciates the many components involved to make the industry tick. His main focus is that the horse's best interests are always at the heart of things. There's nothing like a healthy, happy horse - and, even better, having a successful one makes for very happy owners too!

NB: Shane and Raye are also cat lovers, in particular, "Rodney the Cat" (World Famous in NZ). They are the humans that Rodney chose to be his Kai Tiaka (caretakers) after several "lost and found" episodes, and various wanderings in and around Marton and Taranaki. He is now safely (and permanently!) ensconced in Whanganui living his best life with the McDonnell's who say that looking after him is a privilege. The ongoing tale of Rodney is shared through a website, a Facebook page and even a book! His celebrity profile continues to raise awareness of all lost, dumped, abandoned and stray cats everywhere.

### WHAT HAS BEEN DONE SINCE THE LAST UPDATE?

Up until mid-June, the following has been completed:

### UNDERPASS

- The underpass construction is now 95% complete with fencing and landscaping works to be completed. The completion of the underpass is expected in early July
- Anti-graffiti coating in the underpass has been completed

### POND

- Pond earthworks are now complete with approximately 32,000m3 of earth removed which included 2,500m3 of hard basalt rock
- Installation of the pond liner and the fencing of the pond has been completed

### OTHER

- Main track earthworks have been completed (apart from the construction crossings)
- Carpark and access road earthworks are now complete
- 70% of the carpark and access road pavement is now constructed with HEBs focused on sealing the pavements from the beginning of July
- More than 4000m3 of basalt rock has been excavated and crushed offsite and imported back to be used as subbase for the carpark
- 99% of ambulance earthworks now complete
- 97% of main stormwater drainage complete
- 99% of kerbing in the carpark, access road and underpass complete
- 97% of services ducting (for power, CCTV, speaker, and other communications)
- New signage boards have been installed

### STRATHAYR TRACK PROFILE

- The mainline drainage has now been completed with the instalment of the final three catchment mainlines between the track and the pond.
- Apart from the 60-metre construction crossings, subsoils drains have been installed around the track as well as the gravel laid.
- All sand has now been delivered (35,000 ton)
- The sand layer has been completed across 100% of the track
- Mixing of the StrathAyr profile (sand/peat/mesh) is complete
- In regard to the pond, the manifolds are installed ready to connect to the delivery lines with the installation of the pumps
- Fencing is 75% complete with the remainder to be completed by the middle of July
- StrathAyr is commencing the topping layer this week with the view to seeding the first section of the track in early July with the final section to be seeded two weeks after

### WHAT'S NEXT TO BE COMPLETED?

- Carpark and access road pavement construction
- Ambulance track pavement construction
- Underpass fencing and landscaping
- Infield earthworks
- Offsite rock removal
- Landscaping around the pond

### WHAT'S GONE WELL SINCE THE LAST UPDATE?

 Ensuring the subsoil drainage and gravel layer is laid across the track apart from the construction crossings which ensures the track is now waterproofed – a significant milestone!

## WHAT CHALLENGES HAVE BEEN FACED SINCE THE LAST UPDATE?

- As expressed in previous editions, the main challenge has been wet weather with nearly all of Auckland's annual average rainfall reached before the official start of winter (1 June) which thus includes the, traditionally, driest months in January and February.
- COVID-19 and the resulting absences continue to be a resourcing challenge.

### **EDITORS COMMENT:**

DENISE OUR ADMIN HAS RECEIVED CALLS FROM DISTRESSED OWNERS THAT ARE IN DISPUTE AND SEEKING ADVICE. NZTROF DOES NOT WISH TO INTERVENE IN A CIVIL MATTER BETWEEN PARTIES WHETHER CONTRACTUAL OR SPOKEN.

IN ORDER TO SUPPORT DENISE IN FURTHER SUCH CONTACTS WE SOUGHT NZTR'S POSITION ON THEIR RESPONSE TO OWNERS DISPUTES. THEREBY FOLLOWS...

### DISPUTES BETWEEN AN OWNER AND ANOTHER OWNER.

NZTR also regards disputes between owners as private, civil matters which must be resolved between the parties themselves. NZTR does not have any jurisdiction or authority in this area, to either mediate between the parties to make any binding decisions or orders. If the disputing owners are co-owners of the same horse then there is a standing agreement which governs that relationship, the NZTR Co-Owner agreement. This agreement covers the racing relationship but does not extend to disputes of a more inter-personal nature. The agreement does not cover the situation, for example, where there is a dispute about whether a person has purchased a horse or a share in a horse or not or where there may be unpaid monies. These disputes would have to be sorted out in the Courts if they cannot be resolved otherwise.

### DISPUTES BETWEEN AN OWNER AND A TRAINER.

Disputes between Owners and Trainers are governed by the Trainer Owner Reform (TOR) process. This process governs the two situations, namely (1) where an Owner disputes an invoice from a Trainer and (2) where an Owner has not paid the Trainer by the due date.

Where an Owner disputes the invoice sent by the Trainer, the Owner can lodge a Dispute Notice with NZTR. If the dispute is not resolved, NZTR can appoint a Dispute Tribunal to hear the matter and decide an outcome. The decisions of the Dispute Tribunal are empowered by the Rules of Racing and are therefore binding on the parties.

If an Owner fails to pay a Trainer by the due date of an invoice, the Trainer can make an Enforcement Action Application. NZTR will consider the Enforcement Action Application and can refuse to register any change of ownership of a horse owned by that owner, refuse the transfer of any horse to another trainer and/or freeze the stake payments earned by the Owner and transfer them to the Trainer. Again, the Rules of Racing provide NZTR with the authority to make these orders.

## **NEW ZEALAND EQUINE ACADEMY**

A collaboration between education-provider Skill New Zealand Limited and Byerley Park Limited, New Zealand Equine Academy was created as YOUR pathway to a career in New Zealand's exciting equine industry.



What is the most important thing for the future? Of course, it is those that come after us and carry on what we and that those that went before have put in place. IT IS THE YOUNG!

Some years ago I wrote a story on Byerley Park, meeting Daniel and Elias Nahkle down there at the facility. Daniel said they had a plan to enable an equine academy to provide an education for young aspirants in the equine industry.

To that end they built a classroom on a rise and were seeking a collaboration with NZQA accreditation in mind. Retired jockey Donavan Mansour was lined up to teach and I resolved to see where this went. Then Covid intervened.

But we lead a fairly busy life and when recently I heard Donavan was transferring to Cambridge to set up an Apprentice Jockey Academy, as well as recruiting more students and upskilling students in the workplace. I thought I had better get cracking before he goes.

Auckland Owners President Mike Gething and I headed down, met Donavan at a repurposed barn and were introduced to a roomful of delightful girls who were in the main very engaged. They were from all over the country.

There was maybe a dozen in the class, and they were at week 4 of a 14-week course.

The cost of which is zero as it is partially funded by the TEC (Tertiary Education Commission) and Daniel Nakhle.

Byerley Park teamed up with Education provider Skills New Zealand Ltd to create the New Zealand Equine Academy.

**ENTRY REQUIREMENTS** – A passion for horse, Physical fitness – Age 16 + years.

**GRADUATE PROFILE OUTCOMES** – Knowledge, skills and confidence – Ability to safely handle horses in an equine facility – Proficiently create and maintain a clean and safe equine environment.

The course rises to level 3 and the girls said that they did not have a pre-conceived decision of where they ended up. The first thing was to get a stable hand certificate which assured a proficiency to care and handle horses. And then look at options. There was a lot of enthusiasm to gain riding skills for trackwork. Two girls said they definitely wanted to be jockeys,

Donavan leads the group with a developed syllabus that covers work – life skills and all aspects of equine care.

The course work is varied and wide ranging. Guest speakers attend and provide valuable additional information.

Dunstan Feed nutritionist Gretel Webber is a regular who pitches her talks to whichever level of class present.

Behind the classroom is a well-appointed gym with a lot of apparatus, some for-riding exercises. Notably there was a full sized exercise horse that had a large mirror on the near side so the rider could check the style.

But it is not all classwork and likely it is the "out of class" experiences that keep the group fizzing. There is the "self-care and pitching in" that is part of the course. The students live in on site in the main and prepare their own meals and maintain the living spaces. There are prizes of Countdown and New World vouchers to be won for good effort.

The cost to live on-site is \$180 per week.

Then there are visits where they see vets at work, stud farms and racing stables. They visit feed companies. museums and attend bloodstock sales. They can go to the races with the float driver, see the starter, camera crew and stewards at work.

And then there are the jockeys the strappers – and us the owners to observe.



Prior to going to the Academy, I had sought from a handful of associates what I should say to these young aspirational equine workers. Well I got a page of those comments... who hasn't had a jockey leap off the horse and wordlessly dive for the jockeys room? Maybe a stablehand that ignored you?

But as many grizzles as there were there was supportive comments that wanted the youngies to know how important we see the people who look after our investment. And how we appreciate them sharing a word with us.

The class listened attentively. Mike and I thought it was great to imprint our thoughts on young minds.

I left the sheet of those comments with Donavan. He was with visiting jockey Warren Kennedy. I light-heartedly offered a copy to Warren. He laughingly refused and said, "I know all those."

Change is coming, Donavan is transferring to Cambridge to set up n jockeys' apprentice school and level 3 Equine skills programme. Donavan will remain Programme Leader and under his wing will be Amber Sims, the well – known rider/trainer. Amber is sub 30 years old and the daughter of local trainer Patsy Riley. Amber is a past Ellerslie "Fashions in The Field" winner so she is an all-round class act. The other tutor/riding coach is Renee Faulkner. Renee is from a racing family and is a talented events rider.

Donavan says, "The Academy gets some funding from TEC which does help but Daniel Nahkle has in the main been funding the programme. We do have support from Dunstan Horse Feeds and Majestic Horse Floats and have just brought on NZB as an official sponsor. We are always open to industry supporters, whether its financial, products or even volunteering their time to come and share their expertise with the students."

We recognise the vision of the Nahkle family for the inception of the NZ Equine Academy and the where-with-all to bring it all into being. Donavan has been there from the start and then there is Skill New Zealand the education provider.

In an all-round word, commendable!

Lastly Mike and I would like to say thank you to the girls (class). We thought you were great. If you can – go on and take your chance. We need you. The industry needs you!

What you are learning is a skill that will give you a job around the world. But we would love to see you here.



# **RED** A REALLY GOOD BUGGA

THERE'S A GROUP OF KEEN RACING ENTHUSIASTS WHO MEET AT "THE RUSTY" SPORTS BAR IN MATAKANA, NORTH OF AUCKLAND, ON A SATURDAY AFTERNOON. THE TABLE IS RESERVED, THE SCREENS ARE ON, THE TAB MACHINE IS READY FOR ACTION AND THE CREW BEGIN TO ARRIVE.

Wiri is usually first on the scene, followed by Jimmi and Stretch. Carl, Evan, Paul, Guy, Allan, Dave and others drift in during the afternoon. I usually show up around 2pm, along with Missy (we're the girl power amongst the blokes). Terry turns up at 4pm on the dot. You can set your clock by Terry. And, at some point amongst all this coming and going, Red breezes in. The vibe is already light and happy, even if our picks aren't winning but, the moment Red arrives, it's lifted to the next level. Red could generate laughter and lift the spirits just by being there in the room.

This was the case on Saturday 22nd July 2023. Red arrived later than usual and the banter began. He'd had a big night and told me he'd needed a snooze on the couch before heading to the Rusty for his dose of racing. At least he'd remembered his teeth this time. I'll never forget the day he turned up, late, dishevelled and toothless. And with a host of tales to tell. Red always had tales to tell. There were plenty of tales told about Red too, and the photos to prove them! Funny stories and Red were a quinella.

Throughout the afternoon's racing, we'd keep our eyes open for horses with Red in their name and Red would be duly alerted. Red Something in R4 at Toowoomba at \$3, Red Something Else in R6 at Dubbo at \$50, Red Whatever in R7 at Murray Bridge at \$12... many of us would put a cheeky bet on too.

It's amazing how successful horses with Red in their name are, even those at big odds, and it's a betting technique that had become synonymous with Red. Alongside this, the crew look out for Moon horses for me, "Z" horses for Wiri, Jimmy horses for Jimmi... you get the picture. Loads of fun, and sometimes lucrative!

And then, on Monday 24th July I got a text from Missy to let me know the bad news – Red was dead. I was in a state of shock. Small in stature but huge in character, Red was a stalwart in the local community. In addition to his love of racing, he was a keen golfer and fisherman. He worked hard and lived large. And now he was gone, aged 73. How could this be?

As news of his death spread, so did the sense of disbelief. We all gathered at the Rusty on Friday 28th August to honour Red. The place was packed. He had friends far and wide, in addition to the racing/Rusty crew, and they were all there embracing the opportunity to remember Red. I discovered his real name was Paul Murphy. He'd just always been Red - so named on account of his red hair, although I'd only known him with white hair and a cap on top. I learnt that the guys had had a few drinks in the Rusty on the Sunday night, and Red had been there, in his usual fine form. The next morning, his heart let him down and he was gone.

Speeches were made and tears were shed. And, at the exact moment we all toasted Red, guess what... a horse named Red Hawke won at Echuca and the place erupted! The timing couldn't have been better.

As one of four adopted children, Red grew up on the North Shore. He lived and worked in Australia for a number of years and, more recently, had made the Matakana area his home. We were all richer for him making that move.

Red's many friends were clearly touched by his passing; the emotion in the room was palpable. His death has had a profound effect on his racing buddies and Saturday racing afternoon won't be quite the same without Red around the table.

Horseracing is a game of roller coasters, highs and lows, euphoria and despair, and those who love it are, by default, highly emotional beings even if they resist it or don't realise it. The friendships and camaraderie the sport generates is random, magical and legendary and I love being a part of the Rusty crew.

RIP Red, I was so pleased to have known you, even if only for a few years. You were a really good bugga who touched many lives and made them brighter with your cheeky banter, self-deprecating humour and unpretentious approach to life. Your Rusty crew will miss you greatly – and we'll be sure to keep backing the Red horses! **C**
